#### Safety Features

Browning's Bugout - East Fire Evacuation Route (primitive trail for emergency use only)

Levi Levi Camp Rd - West Fire Evacuation Route (graded dirt road - watch for vehicles)

All Weather Park Roads - Paved

Emergency Landing Zone - Keep 75' Clear Wildfire Rally Point

Ranger Station (Evacuation Checkpoint)

A Storm Shelter (not a fire shelter)

Wildfire Warning Siren Site



Wildfire Warning Siren is tested weekly during fire season. If the Siren continues for 2-3 minutes, look for smoke and evacuate in the opposite direction. If unable to evacuate call 911 and provide location information.

#### Trail Reflectors (placed on trees and trail markers)

White- you're heading away from trailhead Orange- you're returning to the trailhead

### **Trail Features**

1 Deer Canyon Trailhead

6.200

This is Sawmill Canyon. A diverse riparian habitat with native Walnut, Maple, and Cherry trees.

(2) Silver Bell Mine

6.300

Developed in 1870's, the Silver Bell Mine was worked for high-grade silver ore until it was closed in 1994.

(3) Kingman Overlook

6.500

This vantage point looks towards the west at the City of Kingman, and the nearby Cerbat Mountains.

(4) Main Trailhead

6,750

Most folks will start their journey here, please be sure to sign in/out as a safety precaution.

(5) Stonestep Overlook

6.850

This viewpoint to the east is perched at 6850' elevation. The stonesteps are the handywork of the Civilian Conservation Corps who built this trail system in 1936.

(6) Potato Patch Junction

7.000

The Potato Patch loop begin here. Head east for Hualapai Peak, or west for Hayden and Aspen Peak.

(7) Pine Lake Overlook

7.450

The Community of Pine Lake is visible below. On a good day, you can see the San Francisco Peaks of Flagstaff.

(8) Old Settlers Valley (Hualapai Junction) This valley was once home to early settlers of the region and a potato farm, followed by a Boy scout Camp.

(9) Hayden Trails Junction

A major trail junction and important safety point close to the Fire Evacuation Siren and Wildfire Rally Point.

(10) Aspen Peak

While not at the summit, you are close! Most will continue the scramble to the top which is 8,167' above sea level.

(11) Mt. Tipton Overlook

7.800

Mt. Tipton is the highest peak in the Cerbat Mountain Range and is visible to the west.

(12) Dinosaur Rock

8,050

Dinosaur Rock is visible to the south. To the west, is Golden Valley with the Black Mountains on the horizon.

(13) Hayden Peak

The Peak is dominated by private property. Please do not disturb or loiter. Please do enjoy the amazing views.

(14) Hualapai Peak

Congratulations! You have reached the highest summit in Mohave County at 8,415 feet in elevation.

(15) Levi Levi Trading Post

This facility was constructed as a Boy Scout commissary building. Please do not disturb. In the event of an emergency and if you are unable to evacuate, please stage at this location and call 911.

#### TRAIL RULES AND ETIQUETTE

Stay on Established Trails Keep pets on a 6 ft. leash at all times Remove your pet's waste. "Short-cutting" corners is not permitted. Please do not litter. Pass on the Left: Walk on the Right. Communicate to others. Leave the trail better than you found it.

## Hiking during Wildfire Season

- Make someone aware of your hiking plans and
- location prior to going on your hike Monitor weather forecasts and conditions 2. 3.

Bring plenty of drinking water

- Bring a cell phone with GPS and check for service
- Backpack camping and campfires are not permitted in the County Park wilderness.

Maintain situational awareness

If you hear the Wildfire Warning Siren, remain calm and evacuate immediately

During a wildfire emergency, call 911 to report your location and how many are in your group

It is possible that a wildfire may prevent you from

returning to the trailhead safely.

10. If trapped or surrounded by wildfire, seek shelter in a dry wash bed, roadway away from vegetation and vehicle hazards.

11. There is a Wildfire Rally Point just north of the Levi Levi Trading Post for emergency fire sheltering.

12. Never try to out run a Wildfire.

Hualapai Mountain Park offers over 11 miles of trail for users to enjoy a unique forest experience in Mohave County. Situated atop the Hualapai Mountains, the trail system provides panoramic views of the basin and range landscape which is typical of western Arizona. While on the trails, users will be immersed in a variety of mountain habitats and have the opportunity to view numerous wildlife species.

Trail System kiosks, maps, and markers have been specifically labeled to match the corresponding information in this brochure. Trail Segments are color coordinated, Trail Features, and Safety Features are numbered for ease in orienting one's self while using the trails.



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
